#### FRIDAY, OCTOBER 11, 1996

On a bright and beautiful October morning, which the Lord had blessed us with, the Southwestern District Missionary Baptist Association met for her one hundred forty-eighth annual session with Landmark Missionary Baptist Church. We began by singing, "Heaven's Jubilee," "Just A Little Talk With Jesus" and "Meet You By The River" led by Bro. Wallace Douglas, Landmark Church, accompanied by Sis. Kristie Jowers, New Cross Roads Church, on the piano.

The Moderator, Bro. Harold Carver, called the Association to order, for the seventeenth consecutive time, and offered a special welcome, as Moderator, to each and everyone who could be present this day, both messengers and visitors. He read First Corinthians, the 13<sup>th</sup> chapter as a devotional reading and after a few remarks called upon Bro. William House, to lead us in prayer.

Bro. Carver thanked Landmark church, on behalf of the Association, for her willingness to serve as host church for this session. He introduced the pastor and deacon body present to assist any as needed.

The Rules of Decorum were read by the Clerk.

The call for church letters was made and they were presented to the Clerk. The only letter not received was from New Frank's Chapel. The letter from Caledonia Church was not available today but she is represented by Bro. Detroy Allen and Bro. Robert Simmons as messengers. A motion and second was made to seat them and await their letter on Saturday. Motion carried. The Moderator invited any non-member churches present who wished to petition for membership to come forth at this time, and none came forward.

The Reading Clerks began reading the church letters and the roll call of messengers was made as each name was read. At the 11:00 am hour, the Reading Clerks finished the letter from New Cross Roads Church. The Moderator asked for a song and the body sang, "I'd Rather Have Jesus." Bro. Robert Simmons was introduced as the one chosen last year to bring the Introductory Sermon.

Bro. Simmons stepped behind the podium, and thanked the Association for selecting him to preach this sermon. He stated it was a great privilege and honor to stand for God. He asked for

the prayers of those present. He told of the thought that God had placed on his heart and mind. He was moved to pray to God for a moment of prayer.

He told that his thought was "God Hath Spoken." He began with mentioning in the book of Genesis where God spoke all things into existence. He read from the book of John 1:1-14. He stated that the Word was made flesh by our Lord Jesus. He told how God continues to speak to us through his wonderful Holy Spirit.

He told of how God told Noah to build the ark to serve Him. He also mentioned how God spoke to Moses through the burning bush. Today, we must listen to God through his Spirit. We must find ourselves in the center of God's will by following His Holy Spirit. Our trust and faith must be placed in God totally. We all have a job and responsibility to perform just like Moses and Noah. We must answer the call of God to service just like the sinner must answer His call for salvation.

He reminded us that we are the son's of God and joint heirs with Christ because of the love that God has for us. We must be, as children of God, led by the Spirit of God. When we are not following His Spirit, then we are following the spirit of Satan and serving the devil.

Before we can follow the Word of God, we must believe the Word of God. This requires a know – so salvation that is planted deep in our hearts by God. We must be born again, born of that wonderful Spirit.

Today, God is telling us, by speaking through the Spirit, what we should be doing today. This does not include back biting or talking bad about someone. #### Friday Afternoon

The body reassembled after enjoying a most wonderful lunch prepared by the host church and friends and sang "Heaven's Jubilee" and "When He Blest My Soul" lead by Bro. Travis Nance, Pleasant Ridge Church, and accompanied by Sis. Sandra Wilson, Pleasant Ridge Church, on the piano. The Moderator stood and read from First Corinthians 1:10. He asked Bro. Tim Binion, pastor of Victory Missionary Baptist Church, to lead us in prayer.

The Moderator called for the continuance of the reading of the letters by the Reading Clerks. All churches represented with the exception of New Frank's Chapel, whose letter was not received.

A motion and second was made to adopt the letters as read and place the information in the minutes and to seat the 41 messengers and their names be recorded into the minutes. Motion carried.

The Association entered into the election process for the coming year. Bro. Harold Carver was nominated as moderator, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Clarence Carter was nominated as

assistant moderator, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Lee Carter was nominated as clerk, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Ray Smith was nominated as assistant clerk, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried.

A motion and second was made to meet with New Hope Missionary Baptist Church for the 1997 session. Motion carried.

Bro. Harlon Campbell was nominated to preach the Introductory Sermon, and being the only one nominated a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Phillip Halters was nominated to be the alternate for the Introductory Sermon, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Dwight Haskins was nominated to preach the Doctrinal Sermon, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried. Bro. Derrick Jowers was nominated to be the alternate for the Doctrinal Sermon, and being the only one nominated, a motion and second was made to elect by acclamation. Motion carried.

The Moderator called for any correspondence. The Clerk read 4 letters received from sister Associations: Bethel, Enon, Siloam and Wiseman, and also noted that the Association corresponded with these Associations as well as the Big Bear Creek Association. A motion and second was made to adopt these letters and enter them into the minutes. Motion carried.

A motion and second was made to allow ten minutes for chairmen and five minutes for all others as time limits for speaking on a subject. Motion carried.

# **Report on Bible Translations**

When was the last time you took the "Big Black Book" from the shelf and opened it? You have to admit, there is something about the title: **Holy Bible**. Some have called it "The Good Book" – for it is God's written communication to the world.

Of all the millions of books there are in the world there is only one that was authored by God. And there is only one book that reveals God's plan for man. It is an amazing book because it has a divine author and because it tells the wonderful story of God's love for us. But there is another amazing story – the story of how the Bible came to us.

The Bible was originally written in ancient languages (Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek) by men who were inspired by God. The Bible says, "All scripture is given by inspiration of God." A translation closer to the original language (Greek) would be, "All scripture is God-breathed." The works of the Bible came from God and were written by men. The apostle Peter affirmed this when he wrote, "No prophecy of scripture came about by private interpretation." For prophecy came by men of old who were led by the Holy Ghost.

The original text of the Old Testament is in the Hebrew language, with a few brief passages in Aramaic. The original text of the New Testament is in Greek. The Old Testament is the ancient Hebrew Bible, preserved and treasured through many centuries by the Jews. It is also the first part of the Bible of the Christians, who added to it, in the Greek translation, the books of the New Testament.

Almost from the beginning the books of the Bible have been translated into other languages. The earliest translations of the Hebrew Scriptures were into Aramaic, the common language in Palestine and throughout the Middle East after the Exile in the 6<sup>th</sup> century B.C. The Torah (the first five books of the Old Testament) was translated into Samaritan about 400 B.C.

Following the conquests of Alexander the Great, Greek became the common language of the whole eastern Mediterranean area and even of many regions farther east. The Hebrew Scriptures were accordingly translated into Greek at Alexandria from about 250 B.C. onward. Here also were produced the books of the Apocrypha, either by translation from a Hebrew or as original writings in Greek. By the time the early Christian writings appeared (about 50 - 150 A.D.), they were naturally written in Greek, for they arose chiefly in the Greek – speaking Gentile churches.

By 150 A.D. translations of both Old Testament and New Testament books were available in Syraic, Latin, and other languages. There were several versions of the Old Testament in Aramaic. Soon followed the Copic translation, the Armenian, and many more. As time went on, these translations were revised and made more accurate. Near the end of the 4<sup>th</sup> century, St. Jerome revised the Old Latin version of the New Testament, beginning with the Gospels, and completed the Latin version of the Old Testament. Thus he produced the "Vulgate" or common Latin version that was used in the West for many centuries and is still standard in the Roman Catholic church. Around these translations arose a new Christian literature based on their vocabularies and teaching.

Still other local and national groups required translations, partly for missionary purposes. Such were the Gothic, Ethiopic, Slavic, Persian, Arabic, Saxon, and eventually all the emerging languages of the West. In due time came King Alfred's Aelfric's, and Wycliffe's English translations of parts or all of the Bible, and many others, including Luther's German Bible, Tyndale's and Coverdale's English versions, and the French and Dutch. In fact, the process of the Bible translation has never ceased. The Bible has been translated, in whole or in part, into about 1,250 languages and dialects, and millions of copies have been spread abroad.

In 1604, King James I of England authorized a committee of about 50 scholars to prepare a revision of earlier English translations of the Bible. The new version appeared in 1611, and became known as the *King James*, or *Authorized Version*. The beauty and grace of the translation established the King James Version as one of the great treasures of the English language. No important English translations of the Bible appeared for more than 200 years after the publication of the King James Version. During this time, the King James Version was the most widely used translation in the English-speaking world.

# Report on Faith and Practice of True Baptists

How do we identify the faith and practice of a true Baptist? With this subject being so extensive, we the committee report the following:

Are we as true Baptist practicing what God's word teaches us? Would we as true Baptist grant a letter or a recommendation for an unworthy character? Would we as true Baptist approve a worthy person to someone unknown to us? Would we as true Baptist accept a letter of recommendation from someone unknown, or from anyone by us to be less trustworthy? Let us examine a scriptural church letter. The scriptures describes how letters of recommendation were

used from one church of the same faith and order to the other describing that member's faithfulness and ability. Romans 16:1 tells us that Phoebe was recommended by the church at Cenchrea to the sister church at Rome. Any letter of recommendation should always tell the truth about the member petitioning for membership, so that the church receiving would not be mistreated. Although we do not like to admit the fact, God's churches sometimes behave very carnally.

With modernism rapidly growing, how do we honestly distinguish a true Baptist? A true Baptist church requires, when receiving members, a testimony of salvation that includes a time and a place the person got saved and has been baptized by the proper authority. Churches all around way they are true Baptist but do not possess the same doctrinal teachings as a true Baptist church. Even though there may be some saved people in a doctrinally unsound church, we must be careful when we conduct business that we may set the example set by our Lord, so that the unsound church may prayerfully see the error of their way and come under their way and come under the truth of God's word and be identified as one of His true churches.

Beyond the popular religious view, there must be a separation. We, as God's people, must maintain the spirit of discernment, to distinguish between a doctrinally sound and unsound church. God's word teaches trust, honesty, and love, which we must maintain to remain in the faith and practice of true Baptist churches.

## **Report on Ministerial Education**

Education in the ministry is too often a divisive topic among brethren. Even in our age, the ministerial education subject has unnecessarily become a test of fellowship among brethren and churches who otherwise touched and agreed upon the more weighty matters of Gospel truth.

To "educate" means to develop mentally, morally, or aesthetically, especially be instruction. This surely applies to one who administers the Gospel. We must conclude, therefore, that if "education" results in being "educated," then one's education will be a process not confined to any certain period in life, for one never reaches the point of possessing every fact. The minister who assumes his education ends the last day he walked out the schoolhouse door deprives the Lord's Cause of an asset that could be used for His glory. In the vocation where humility blended with wisdom is an absolute necessity, education must be used as a too – brought out, used, then prevented from remaining as an item on display. Every skilled craftsman is continually alert for new tools and new methods by which both the quantity and beauty of his work can be enhances. SO SHOULD THE MINISTER CONSIDER HIS EDUCATION!

The minister should consider "education" himself nothing more and nothing less than acquiring new tools and honing his skills in the use of those of which he is already in possession. Any factual knowledge which may be used to build and lend more beauty to the Cause of Christ is an asset. THE MINISTER SHOULD NEVER EXPECT THE LORD TO DO THIS PART OF

THE WORK FOR HIM. In Paul's first letter to Timothy, he admonished the young minister to give attendance to reading, exhortation, and to doctrine, I Tim. 4:13. In his second letter, Paul encouraged to study in order to "rightly divide the word of truth," II Tim. 2:15. Our fifteenth Article of Faith states our bedrock belief that God calls men, by His Spirit, to preach the Gospel, and that it is the duty of the individual thus called to study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth. A minister, be he young or old, is encouraged to read the lives of good men, men who climbed the hills and spanned the valleys, and recorded their wisdom gained by having done so. Wiser is the minister who reads their books, exposes himself to their wisdom. Listens to accounts of their failures, and lets his faith grow by observing God's grace in their victories.

WITH WHATEVER EXCELLENCE OUR BRETHREN MAY HAVE POSSESSED HOWEVER, IT IS ALL BORROWED AND TO SOME DEGREE OR ANOTHER WILL BE MINGLED WITH ERROR. AS THE PUREST AND MOST REFRESHING WATER IS ALWAYS FOUND AT THE FOUNTAINHEAD, THE GOSPEL MINSTER WILL FIND HIS PUREST SOURCE OF UNDERSTANDING TO BE THE HOLY SCRIPTURES. FROM THE WORD OF GOD SHOULD HIS DECISIVE RULE ORIGINATE. HUMAN COMPOSITIONS ARE SUBJECT TO BEING FALLIBLE—HOLY SCRIPTURES ORIGINATE WITH MEN WHO WROTE AS THEY WERE INSPIRED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT AND WILL ENCOURAGE THE MINISTER TO THINK FOR HIMSELF.

Our ministers are encouraged to place every fact on any worthy subject in their storehouse of knowledge. IT'S CALLED **EDUCATION**, AT WHATEVER AGE AND FROM WHATEVER SOURCE IT ORIGINATES. Then pray for wisdom that God will help arrange them in a way that will enlighten the minds and affect the hearts of both the minister and his hearers. Store it then in the safest place, for someday it will be useful.

In conclusion, we exhort our ministers, to SEEK THE WAYS AND WILL OF GOD WITH A PREPARED MIND, WHICH IS ACQUIRED BY STUDY (BY **EDUCATION**), AND WITH A PREPARED HEART, WHICH IS ACQUIRED ON OUR KNEES BEFORE GOD. <u>REDUCE IT TO DAILY, PERSONAL PRACTICE, THEN TEACH IT AND PREACH IT WITH A BURNING HEART.</u> TO YOU WILL BE THE BLESSING AND TO GOD BE THE GLORY!!

## Saturday, October 12, 1996

The Association began the second day of sessions by singing, "Mansion Over The Hilltop," and "I Want To Know More About My Lord" lead by Bro. Ricky Lewis, Oak Grove (HC) Church, and accompanied by Bro. Kevin Holland, Mixie Church, on the piano. The Moderator

took the stand and after a few remarks read from Psalms 34:1-10. He asked Bro. Clarence Carter, New Cross Roads Church, to lead us in prayer.

The letter from Caledonia Church was read and a motion and second was made to adopt the letter as read. Motion carried.

Bro. John Lewis introduced the deacons of the host church again to assist in any needs. The roll call of the messengers listed 36 messengers present and seated for voting. The reading of the reports was continued from the previous session.

### Report on Humanism and Its Effects on Our Churches

Humanism, is a philosophy, an attitude that emphasized the dignity and worth of the individual. A basic premise of humanism is that people are rational beings who possess within themselves the capacity for truth and goodness. Colossians 2:8 tells us "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ." Mark 10:18 states "And Jesus said unto him, Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is, God." We as true Baptist believe that man fell from the righteous state that he was created, and because of this fall he is sinful and depraved. (Articles of Faith #3) Except he hear the truth of the gospel and believe and respond to it he has no hope.

Historically the humanist movement started in Italy. Although in Italy humanism developed principally in the fields of literature and art, in central Europe, where it was introduced chiefly by German scholars, the movement extended into the fields of theology and education, and was a major underlying cause of the Reformation.

One of the most influential scholars in the development of humanism in France was the Dutch cleric Desiderius Erasmus, who played an important part in introducing the movement into England. There humanism was definitely established at the University of Oxford, and at the University of Cambridge. From the universities it spread throughout English society.

This philosophy or way of thinking has taken on new titles in the past few years. It might be called a self esteem course, motivational or positive thinking skills. While we desire to see our children and ourselves have good self esteem and to think in a positive way, we desire it to be based on the truth of the Word of God. There is a God in heaven who loves all and desires to bring all back into fellowship with himself. This truth should be what gives people hope. Humanism, after removing all the pretty wrapping paper, is in reality Anti-God. It says we are good while the Word of God ways we are sinners, it ways we are capable of finding truth within ourselves without God, when Jesus said "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." (John 14:6)

The affects of Humanism on the Lord's Church are far reaching. Unsaved people have the belief that they are pretty good human beings and live better than some who claim to be Christians. They measure their goodness by the yardstick of society. If you haven't murdered, robbed, or committed some other gross evil, then you must be pretty good. They have lost sight of the need for a savior or for the need to go to church. People have been spoiled through philosophy and vain deceit. Our own children that attend church regularly are receiving mixed messages and have become confused. The world preaches Humanism to them, when at church they hear that Jesus died to save them from their ruined state. We see fewer people at church, fewer people at the alter and fewer people being saved. Humanism is not the total reason for this but is a contribution factor.

Humanism also teaches there is no higher authority than the intellect of man. Man is supreme and needs no God therefore making himself as god. This goes back all the way to the Garden of Eden. The serpent promised Eve wisdom by partaking of the forbidden fruit and said "ye shall be as gods." (Genesis 3:5) Satan continues to use the same lie but wraps it up in a different package.

# Report on Financing the Lord's Work

J. M. Pendleton defines a visible church as "a congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by his laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by his word."

If you were to select several people at random today, and ask each one what the word "church" means to them, you would receive a variety of responses. Some might say a building set a part or consecrated for pubic worship, and others would probably name a specific denomination or organized religious sect.

As man's definition of "church" has changed over the years, so has his attitude toward caring for the needs of the church. The church is not unlike any other organization. Both the local membership and the facilities they use to carry out their religious functions have basic needs. An individual member left unattended will stray away form the intended purpose of the organization, and a building without maintenance will deteriorate into a state of disrepair.

In the early days of the church the apostles kept the disciples focused on their purpose while caring for both their spiritual and physical needs (Acts 4:32-37). However, as the size of the congregation grew, the apostles instructed the brethren to nominate seven men whom they would appoint over the business of the church. This was done so the apostles could give themselves continually to prayer, and to the ministry of the word (Acts 6:3-4).

The labor of the ministry was never intended to be a part-time vocation. Neither were the laborers to receive part-time pay. True enough, the pillars of the early church, such as the apostle Paul, were learned in a trade by which they could earn a wage (Acts 18:1-3); but Paul also instructed the church at Corinth that it was the church's responsibility to support all ministers who have been chosen by the Lord to preach the gospel; regardless of their field of labor. (1 Cor. 9:14).

Paul wrote the church at Corinth (2 Cor. 11:9) "...when I was present with you, and wanted, I was chargeable to no man: for that which was lacking to me the brethren which came from Macedonia supplied:" Brethren; if we as Baptists and members of this great Association truly believe in the autonomy of our local assemblies, then we must assuredly believe in our individual responsibilities to fully support our pastors.

Regarding our place of assembly which we call the church house, let us bring to remembrance the words of our Lord as He spoke through Moses to the people of God; (Exo.

25:8) "And let them make me a sanctuary; that I may dwell among them;" and Lev 19:30) "Ye shall keep my Sabbaths, and reverence my sanctuary: I am the LORD."

As Baptists we need to be aware of our responsibility to support the ministry and reverence the sanctuary of the Lord. When we assemble, we must be willing to freely support the ministry with our prayers, presence, and means; and prepare our minds, our hearts, and our place of worship in anticipation and expectation that the Lord will come and dwell among us. If not, we might as well stay home.

## The Report on Financing the Lord's Work was read and spoken to by Bro. Gary Kirk.

The Moderator called for a song and the body stood and sang "Since He Gave Me This Heart of Love." He then introduced Bro. Lynn Stapleton to deliver the Doctrinal Sermon.

Bro. Stapleton stood before the congregation and thanked the Association for the opportunity to preach. He also thanked Landmark Church for being here and willing to serve as the host church. He also thanked God for being here this day.

He described how he needed help today, but knew where his help would come from. He described the subject that the Lord had placed on his heart. The thought for this sermon was "Modernism and how it affects our unity." He read Psalms 34:1-10 which was the scripture reading of the morning. Isn't the Lord and his mercy and Spirit wonderful. The power of God is always manifest if we will just allow Him to lead.

He took his thought from the third verse, "O magnify the LORD with me, and <u>let us exalt his name together</u>." We do not have time to waste in the service of our Lord. He reminded us of Jesus command to preach the gospel to all. God will make a way if we will allow. The work that is before us is the same as was before the young church, and the apostles. Genesis describes the need of man to not be alone, and God formed woman to be his help. It is not good for man to be alone, for Christians to be alone, or for churches to be alone. When the missionaries were sent forth, they were sent two by two, and their prayer was for help in the harvest.

The world is full of deceivers, with multiple denominations, more than 300 alone of just "christian" organizations. They are similar in the fact they place a work of some form for salvation not true heart – felt grace. They are all spawned by Satan. He is satisfied with people being religious as long as they aren't following the true religion of Jesus and Him crucified.

He described how prayer in school is a "dead horse." We spend much time and effort fighting this battle when we need to return to the approach used on the day of Pentecost when revival broke forth and people turned toward God for salvation.

He turned his attention to the definition of "modernism." He defined it as the devaluation of the fundamental beliefs of religion to meet contemporary ideas. In the world today, we have drifted so far from God that we are unable to truly discern right from wrong. We must stop the misuse of the term "modernism" for details that are different not wrong. David went out before Goliath not with a sword or arrows but with a sling. That was not appropriate to man but was very satisfactory to God. The sling might well be called "modernism" today.

We need to be persistent in the seeking of the salvation of the lost. That is our responsibility to God.

We need to use the things that God can give us and does give us to use to reach the lost. The lost world must see that risen Savior that takes away the sins of the world in us not the ways of the world

We need to be on guard against those that will teach man's plan of salvation and the attempt to devalue God's plan of salvation. Let us work together in this work not apart.

Let us stand against the true "modernism" of this world together while allowing the creative genius of God to be make manifest to reach a lost and dying world.

The Moderator called for a song so that we might offer the right hand of fellowship to Bro. Stapleton for his efforts. A motion and second was made to adjourn for lunch. Motion carried. We were dismissed in prayer by Bro. Larry Johnson, New Liberty Church.

## **Saturday Afternoon**

After enjoying another bountiful meal, we began the afternoon session by singing, "I Love To Tell The Story" and "Just A Little Talk With Jesus" lead by Bro. Ricky Lewis, Oak Grove (HC) Church and accompanied by Sis. Kristie Jowers, New Cross Roads Church. The Moderator expressed thanks to all those involved in preparing the meals for the two days. He read from First Thessalonians 5:1-4 and asked Bro. Jerry Dodd, Concord Church, to lead us in prayer.

We continued with the report on Financing the Lord's Work. The Report on Financing the Lord's Work was adopted and also spoken to by Bro. John Mullins.

# **Report on Church Discipline**

We, your committee on Church Discipline, submit the following:

We believe that failure to enforce discipline has been a hindrance to many of our churches. Romans 16:17, "mark them which cause divisions and offenses contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned; and avoid them." We, also believe that forgiveness is a part of discipline. When a church member comes before the church and acknowledges his wrongs, it is the duty of the church to forgive and restore that person into full fellowship.

First Thessalonians 5:14, "Now we exhort you, brethren, warn them that are unruly, comfort the feebleminded, support the weak, be patient toward all men." The goal of church discipline is forgiveness after the reprendmend has been given and received.

Churches of today don't usually exercise church discipline as churches in the past have done. At least this is true in the formal sense of the term church discipline.

Matthew 18:7-22 tells of the way to safely work out differences between each other, one on one. It this doesn't work, go back to reason with the other person and take two witnesses that each word may be established. If that doesn't work, then bring it to the church.

Informal discipline is used much more today than formal discipline. Less people know about the difference if a problem can be worked out by two individuals. A few individuals will know about the difference if carried to the second phrase.

Peter asked the Lord the question how oft shall a brother sin against him and he forgive that person? Peter went on to say, seven times, but Jesus said no, until seventy times seven.

We find that church discipline is to reprove the person or persons that are causing the hindrance and offense to the church and to God. If the person that caused the offense apologizes

before the church or to an individual, it is the duty of the church or individual to forgive that person.

So, the heart of discipline is the forgiving as Christ said in Matthew 18.

## **Report on Rewards in Heaven**

In order to receive a reward in heaven, a person must first get to heaven which requires being saved by grace through faith. After salvation occurs, baptism should be top priority for that saved individual which demonstrates to the world that he/she has been saved and is going to heaven. After salvation and baptism occur, then that saved individual will begin obtaining or losing rewards in heaven. Webster's Dictionary tells us that a reward is "something that is given in return for good or evil done or received". The unsaved will have no reward in heaven, but will receive his/her reward in hell. The saved will not receive a bad reward in heaven, however I Corinthians 3: 12, 13, & 15 Paul tells us that our spiritual works will be tested to see if it is or good or evil, therefore he/she could lose a reward. "Now if any man build upon this foundation gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, stubble; Every man's work shall be made manifest: for the day shall declare it, because it shall be revealed by fire; and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss: but he himself shall be saved; yet so as by fire."

Who will receive rewards in heaven? The scriptures tell us that the faithful will be rewarded for spiritual service. These faithful include: (a) Soul winners – Daniel 12:3 says, "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars for ever and ever;" (b) Humble servants Matthew 10:42 states, "And whosoever shall give to drink unto one of the little ones a cup of cold water only in the name of a disciple, verity I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward." (c)Faithful stewards – Matthew 25:23 tells us, "His Lord said unto him, Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou in to the joy of thy lord." (d) The benevolent – Luke 6:35 says, "But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again; and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest; for he is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil."

The scriptures also tell us that those who endure suffering will be rewarded. Matthew 5:11-12 says, "Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for my sake. Rejoice and be exceedingly glad: for great is your reward in heaven: for so persecuted they the prophets which were before you."

Finally Jesus tells us in Matthew 16:27, "For the son of man shall come in the glory of his Father with his angels; and the he shall reward every man according to his works." I Corinthians 15:58 tells us, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

What will be the rewards in heaven? In II Timothy 4:8, Paul tells us that we will receive a crown of righteousness. "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto them also that love his appearing." Paul also tells us in I Corinthians 9:25 that we will receive an incorruptible crown. "And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible." Peter states in I Peter 5:4 that we shall receive a crown that will never fade away. "And when the chief Shepherd shall appear, ye shall receive a crown of glory that fadeth not away."

There is no need to get upset because we don't know for sure what our rewards will be until we get to heaven. No matter what our rewards are, I know they will be great because they will be coming from God.
